# NEBOSH NATIONAL CERTIFICATE IN FIRE SAFETY AND RISK MANAGEMENT

## DURATION

13 weeks (5 Weeks - Taught Sessions + 8 Weeks - Distance Learning)  
1 Exam Day

## COURSE DETAILS

The NEBOSH National Fire Safety and Risk Management Certificate provides an appropriate breadth of underpinning knowledge for non-specialists in fire safety to enable them to discharge more effectively their organisational duties or functions with respect to workplace fire safety. This course is delivered over 13 weeks by a combination of taught sessions and distance learning. NGC 1 is one afternoon/evening per week for 5 weeks followed by 8 weeks of distance learning (FC 1). All elements of the course are delivered by our dedicated team from the Redcar and Cleveland College Health and Safety Academy.

## WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

This accredited NEBOSH Certificate training course is for managers, supervisors, employee representatives and others. It aims to equip holders to contribute to the conduct and review of fire risk assessments and fire preventive and protective measures within most workplaces.

## HOW WILL THE COURSE BE ASSESSED?

Candidates are assessed with written examinations for each of the two taught units (NGC1 and FC1). Candidates must carry out a fire risk assessment (FC2) in a real workplace to demonstrate application of the theory studied.
